Chapter 3: Are You Ready for College?

If you are either unsure about your motivations or timing for college or need some touch points to determine if you are ready, then read on.

Here are the top considerations for determining your college readiness:

Are you able to learn?

The ability of learn new concepts continuously, even under the stress of tight deadlines is important. The complexity of subject matter will also be much more advanced than in high school. So before you start college, as a trial run, please get into the habit of learning and reading for hours at a time. Take a couple of courses, either online or in a classroom, read some books, join a library and get into the habit of <u>uninterrupted</u><u>uninterrputed</u> studying!

Focus, <u>discipline</u>, <u>Discipline</u> and <u>motivation</u>Motivation

Only if you have focus and discipline will you be able to avoid all distractions and spend time studying for hours every day. You will have to reduce or eliminate TV watching, and also minimize time with family and friends, or at leastatleast schedule them over the holidays. Do you have the motivation to take on long hours of study and stress during exams, and still be inspired by the thought that you'll have your college degree at the end of it?

Timing and unexpected eventsUnexpected Events

Have there been any unexpected events recently in your life, either positive or negative, that can impact your college studies? If so, what will be the impact and how much of your time do you anticipate it will require? Do you have any other commitments that will repeatedly take you away from studies? If so, work on clearing them before starting the college process.

Field of study

Have you determined the college major you want to pursue? Is there a

particular field in which you have some knowledge and practical experience? If you are otherwise ready for college but only need to determine your college major, I recommend you start identifying your key strengths as described later on in this chapter!

Also, as mentioned in the overview, there are <u>somea number of</u> issues with the traditional college system. This makes it all the more critical that you have a more affordable and flexible approach to college that is customized to your interests.

Understanding some <u>myths</u> about the traditional college system will motivate you to start thinking of a better alternative.

Testing for college readinessCollege Readiness

ACT³ tests will help you assess your readiness for college. With CLEP⁴ tests you can gather college credits in areas that you already have sufficient knowledge, or can easily learn. It will also enable you to understand the level of focus and effort your college studies will require.

CLEP tests are very affordable and being able to successfully complete and score well in some CLEP tests will give you a lot of confidence about your college-level abilities. In <u>Chapterchapter</u> 8, *Credit Sources*, I will go over some great resources that can ensure CLEP success for you.

If you like, you can even take CLEP while you are still in high school, or right after high school, or at any other time which works for you.

Myths about Traditional Colleges traditional colleges

Myth<u>1:#</u>1 – *Beauty/<u>aesthetics</u> <u>Aesthetics</u> of the campus translates to educational quality*

Nowadays, colleges are run as ruthless for-profit ventures with huge campuses and almost <u>resortlikeresort-like</u> facilities, and with very little focus on academics. Students in turn end up taking huge student loans to fund their studies at such colleges, mistakenly equating aesthetics with educational quality!

Myth# 2: - One size fits all One-size-fits-all

According to NCES⁵ <u>at leastatleast</u> 70<u>percent</u>[%] of undergraduates are <u>nontraditional</u><u>non-traditional</u> students⁷. Some of these students work <u>full</u> <u>timefulltime</u>, some of them have dependents, and many of them attend college <u>part timepart-time</u>. So there is no one-size-fits-all with respect to college to college.

Myth# 3<u>:</u> – Traditional <u>college</u> assures successful completion for the majority

According to a study published in USA Today, only 56 <u>percent</u>% of those who enroll in a <u>four-year</u>4-yr traditional bachelor's degree are able to graduate within <u>six</u>6 years⁶. Data on community colleges shows that only about 20 <u>percent</u>% of them complete their associate degree within <u>three years</u>3 yrs. This has a lot to do with the financial burden of traditional colleges, combined with the lack of flexibility of the traditional college education. Therefore, flexible colleges are the route to timely success with college, due to their affordability and the ability to customize the curriculum and student schedules.

Myth# 4: - College education guarantees employment readiness

Though this myth has already been shattered, I'll add it here for further clarification! It has become a general trend to receive <u>hundreds100's</u> of job applications for a lot of open job positions across industries. To increase the odds of finding employment after graduation, students need to ensure that they customize their college education to include career-oriented skills and training that are relevant for their chosen major. Such customized education is more
